I may not have climbed the ranks at a company, or gained my degrees, or radically changed all the things I need to in the world (yet!), but I have grown in ways that are imperceptible unless you knew me a decade ago, compared to the woman I am today.

I am changing the face of academia day by day, just by being here. By being a woman in STEM, from a working-class background and a whole bingo card of diversity categories. I am trying to make the world a better place day by day and be a trail blazer so the next person who doesn't fit the mould doesn't have to dismantle the system before they embark on their journey, like I have done. I had my dream to become a doctor taken away on health grounds, cut adrift without knowing what the future holds, but I have found my place in the world, with a reason "to be", to do some measurable good and help people to help themselves. I went from scrambling to my future to thriving on an alternative pathway (and some might say a strange way round of getting my degrees and further training), but even though I'm now a wheelchair user living with chronic pain, my future hasn't gone. I will be a psychotherapist, despite it all. I plan to come home and practise in our local area in the future, to make a difference to the area that helped shape me.

AVA helped fire my passions for the subject areas I study today. I wasn't made to be "smaller" to fit in, I was encouraged and allowed to spread my wings.

I had supportive, passionate, and knowledgeable teachers, for that I am grateful.

Never give up! Despite what life throws at you and how hard it gets, never stop striving, but also don't be afraid to ask for help from your friends, teachers, family, healthcare providers, pastoral care etc. Don't be afraid to do things differently, as cheesy as it sounds be unapologetically "you" Take all the opportunities you're presented with, your time at school is a great time to try out different things and build your skill set, without the pressure/risk of the "real world"

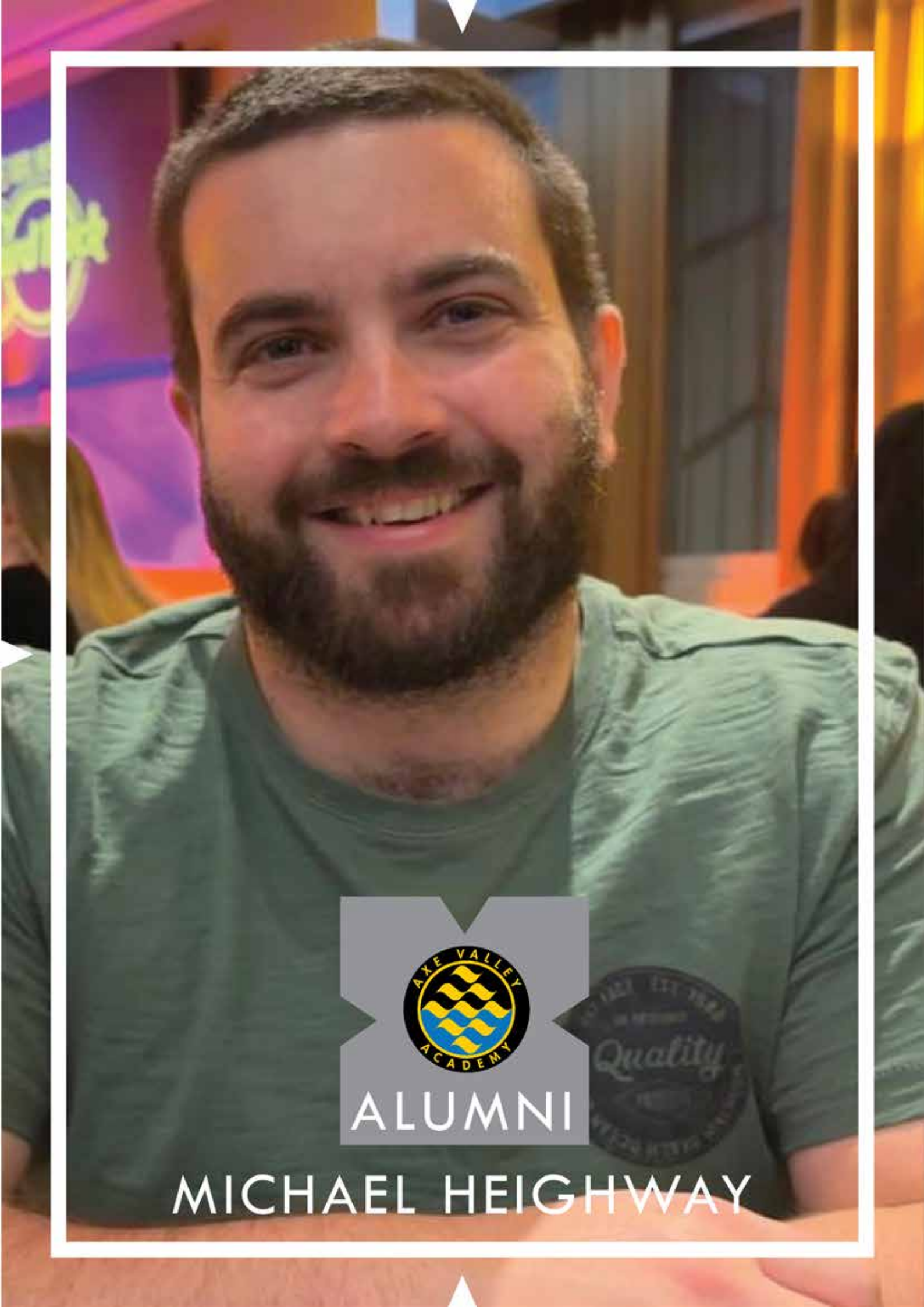

Tips/Advice you would give current students to help them to prepare for life after Axe Valley Academy.

(Sorry, some are cheesy and a lot of them are too long, but these are the rules I try to live by).

- Lead by example, even if you're only leading yourself.
- Treat people as you would like to be treated. Respect is important and you should grant it to others until they prove they don't deserve it.
- Be forgiving. Everyone makes mistakes, you will too.
- Don't take life too seriously. Success and fun are not mutually exclusive.
- Put yourself out there and don't be afraid to fail. Getting good at anything means failing first, often repeatedly. People who mock you for failing are afraid to fail themselves so just get used to the criticism.
- Not everyone will like you, get comfortable with that.
- Manners matter, think before you speak and don't allow others to be rude under the guise of honesty. It's easy to be rude, the easy path is not always the most rewarding one (take the stairs, not the elevator ;)).
- Don't be afraid to change and adapt to new information or circumstances.

Ultimately, people respect you more for being adaptable as long as you stay true to your morals.

LAST WEEK 22 students from Year 10, and 3 from Year 9 successfully completed their Bronze qualifying expedition. Our students left Uffculme School ascending up through the Blackdown Hills, to a warm welcome and the great facilities of Forest Glade campsite. They camped and cooked in the 5 acre field, before getting an early start on Saturday with most up and preparing breakfast before 6:30am! They then wound their way down to Hemyock for a timely finish. The quality of navigation, hiking and campcraft was excellent, and our expedition providers 'Chase Training' commented on how the entire group were more like experienced 'Silver' DofE candidates rather than 'Bronze'. The majority of the year 9 Bronzes are completing their preparations for their qualifying expedition near Huish Woods Taunton on June 29th and 30th 2023. Good attendance sets students up for success. The better their attendance, the more subject areas they are covering, and the more well rounded their education will be. As well as this, good attendance will mean more opportunities to make friends, meet new people and be involved in extra-curricular clubs and activities.

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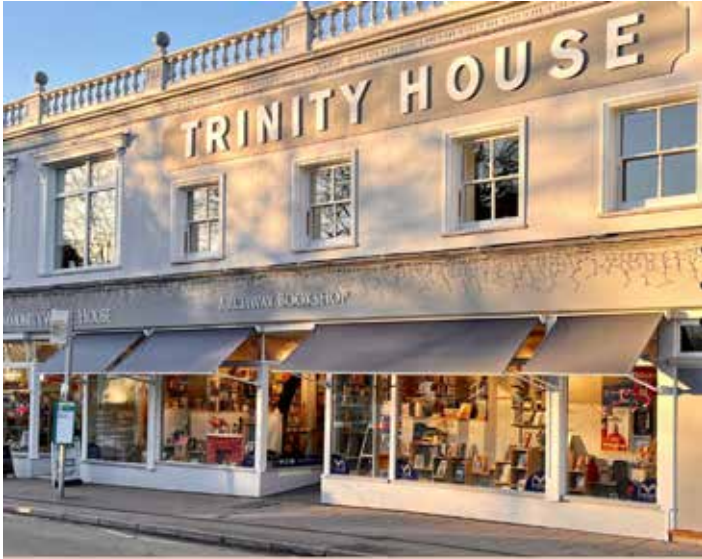

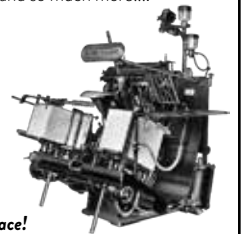
